KINDNESS ROCKS

Have you heard of the Kindness Rock movement that has swept the nation? Have you found a painted rock at a park, library or store?

The Kindness Rock movement is about getting positivity and upbeat affirmations out to help people get through the stress of the days. If you do an internet search for Kindness Rocks you will find millions of examples, and



learn that there are Rock Groups who share the mission. We have several here on O'ahu for example. The largest one here is #Oahu Rocks.

If you search the internet you will see postings from folks all over the island. There are a couple of established methods for getting the rocks out there as well as cheering up the members themselves.

First there are Fairy Doors scattered around the island that serve as trading posts for the rock painters. We have one right here in the Halawa Xeriscape Garden! If you take the garden path towards the bridge it will be on your right side.



The concept is at a minimum "Take One, Leave One". Many Kindness Rock painters leave quite a few and take only one. Sometimes you will see blank rocks left. Those are to help someone get started without having to purchase a whole bag of rocks.

There are Facebook pages dedicated to the Local Kindness Rock Groups. There people share rocks that have been found around the island. They also share their supply tips and methods as well as rocks in progress.

People of all ages from 2 year olds to very senior retirees are painting rocks with sayings or pictures to share and help counter the negative events out there.

We just had our first rock painting Workshop in the Garden the end of September (2018). It was essentially rock painting 101.

The theme was learning and utilizing the Scientific Names for our plants in order to label them in our pots or

gardens. We had a range of very young artists to seniors who had varying artistic skills. It is not about talent. It is eye opening for participants to become aware of how fun it can be and also how therapeutic.

Come enjoy the Kindness Rock movement. Make painting rocks an event with your children, parents and friends. Think of all the people that can be cheered up by finding a rock that makes them smile or gives them the motivation to keep going.



Did you know...?

Little Fire Ant (LFA) was recently detected on O'ahu in Kāne'ohe (12/2018) and the Punahou carnival (2/2019)! The O'ahu Invasive Species Committee and Hawai'i Department of Agriculture are working to eradicate LFA on O'ahu.

How to survey for LFA:

1.Smear a thin coat of peanut butter on chopstick or popsicle stick.

2. Place peanut-buttered sticks in, around, and on plants. Leave the sticks for an hour.

3. Carefully pick up the sticks (so the ants don't fall off!), and place them in a sealable plastic bag. Write your name, the date and a contact number on the bag, and **freeze** for at least 24 hours to kill the ants.

PEST ALERT! Naio Thrips (Klambothrips myopori)



Naio (*Myoporum sandwicense*) is a plant native to Hawai'i that can be a groundcover, shrub or tree. It has long, narrow, green leaves with white to slightly pink flowers. The wood of older plants has a scent similar to sandalwood, which is why it's also known as false sandalwood even though it is not related to true sandalwood (*Santalum* spp.). Naio is an important component in native Hawaiian dry-mesic forests.

In 2005, California landscape and nursery *Myoporum* started to display extensive leaf curling/galling caused by a new, undescribed threat. It was named *Klambothrips myopori* or Naio thrip. By 2009, Naio thrips were detected on Hawai'i island and in November 2018, Naio thrips were discovered in Honolulu.

Hawaii Department of Agriculture, Department of Land and Natural Resources and other organizations are treating known infestation sites and are monitoring Naio plants for new Naio thrip populations.
