Enjoy the convenience of viewing your bill 24/7 from wherever you are when you sign up on the Board of Water Supply (BWS) Online Service Portal.

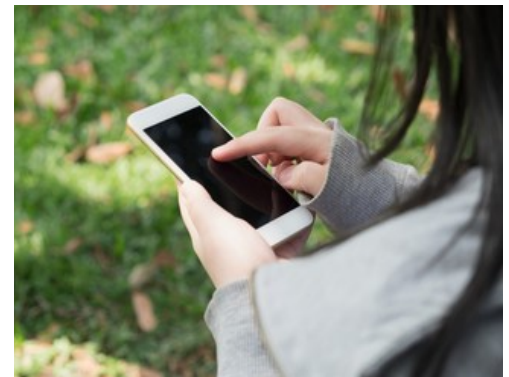
Click on the “My Account” button on any page at www.boardofwatersupply.com to sign up or sign in.

The portal provides secure access to your account information. You can start/stop service and communicate with the BWS to report billing issues and concerns when it

is convenient for you. Even if it’s outside of our regular business hours.

Account holders can also choose to enroll for paperless billing to reduce their carbon footprint.

Also, the BWS accepts Visa, Mastercard, and Discover debit and credit card payments for single-family residential rate payers only and does not charge a credit card processing fee.

Using a Home Water Filter is a Personal Decision

Q. I am concerned about chemicals I've heard about in the news that can contaminate our ground water. Do I need to purchase a water filter for my home?



A. The Board of Water Supply (BWS) regularly tests its water to ensure it is safe to drink and use.

Water served by the BWS meets all federal and state drinking water standards and does not require treatment by a home filtration unit.

Using a home water filter is a personal decision and there are many products to choose from.

The BWS does not endorse any consumer water treatment products or brands.

BWS's advice to consumers regarding a water filtration device is to:

- understand what the product does or does not do;
- use the unit according to the manufacturer instructions; and
- make sure it is properly maintained.

Various Observances Heighten Water Awareness Year-Round

Using water efficiently year-round is important. Especially for Board of Water Supply (BWS) customers.

After the Navy's Red Hill fuel spill in 2021, three Aiea-area wells – one of which supplied 20% of metropolitan Honolulu's water -- continue to be shut down as a precaution to prevent further fuel contamination of the island's aquifer.

One way the BWS reminds the public to be mindful of water use is with various observances throughout the year that promote the value of water.
